Cathy's Corner

What is a Pet Trust and What Does it Do?

It's not a topic that most people like to discuss, but being prepared in the case of a sudden illness, disability, accident or death, is something a responsible pet owner must do. Chances are you will outlive your pet, but what would happen if you didn't? Make sure to set a plan for your pet in your absence. One option to ensure your pet's care is to set up a pet trust; and although you can't legally leave money directly to a pet in a traditional will, a pet trust is a legally binding document that allows you to:



- 1. Set aside money to be used for the continued care of your pet if something happens to you and you're no longer able to tend to its needs.
- 2. Provide detailed, written instructions for the continued care of your pet.
- 3. Designate a caregiver to take over guardianship of your pet or to find them a permanent home.
- 4. Appoint a trustee to make sure your funds are used according to your written instructions.

You can Google "Pet Trust" for further help with setting up a Pet Trust. Or, if you prefer, contact an estate attorney. They will be able to answer any questions you may have about setting up a pet trust.

Senior for Senior Program

In an effort to provide exceptional customer service, OC Animal Care offers its Senior For Senior program. The program provides a discounted adoption rate for senior citizens, 65 years and older, that adopt any animal 5 years of age or older. This is limited to one adoption per household.

There are many advantages to adopting from your local animal shelter, but adopting an older pet may be even more rewarding. Homeless animals over 5 years of age that come to OC Animal Care are more difficult to place despite the fact that many endure the stresses of a shelter environment much better than their younger shelter mates. Many adult animals have received some obedience and/or potty training and are generally more calm and affectionate.

There are proven benefits of pet ownership. Pets can lower our blood pressure and anxiety, pets alleviate depression and help us cope with stress, and pets enrich our lives by offering unconditional love!

Wanted: Foster Homes



ach year, once the weather begins to warm up, kittens pour into OC Animal Care by the litter. While some kittens are quickly put up for adoption, others are too young to be placed in their permanent homes. Kittens weighing less than two pounds cannot

be adopted as they are too young to be spayed or neutered. This is where our dedicated foster homes step in. Foster Caretakers provide food, shelter, socialization and love to underage kittens until they are big enough for adoption at the shelter. Usually, kittens stay in their foster homes for one to two weeks. In 2008, 468 animals were placed into foster homes and given a second chance at finding their new forever families. Volunteers Get Their Groom On

id you know that OC Animal Care offers its volunteers educational opportunities in animal related programs? By providing classes in animal handling, training, and grooming, volunteers not only expand their own skills, they learn new ways to increase the adoptability and happiness of shelter animals. In March, volunteers were given the opportunity to learn how to groom dogs at a special class held at Claws N Paws Day Spa in Fountain Valley. Grooming salon owner, Christi Fabisiak, opened her doors to fifteen OC Animal Care volunteers and five shelter dogs. Fabisiak gave instruction and hands-on practice to the volunteers on shaving, brushing, scissoring, bathing and drying the dogs. The dogs, which arrived at the shelter dirty and matted, left the grooming salon with new, beautiful hairdos. Many of the dogs were adopted immediately upon return to the shelter. Volunteers who attended the training continue their grooming efforts at OC Animal Care using the supplies in the shelter grooming area where they clip and clean dogs that are available for adoption.
